UNESCO Chair on Museum Collections, Repatriation and Interculturality

In 2025 the Reinwardt Academy has been awarded a UNESCO Chair on Museum Collections, Repatriation and Interculturality. The Chair focuses on research, education, and public engagement related to cultural heritage from colonial contexts, with special attention to museums.

International collaboration and knowledge exchange are central to this. The Chair fosters dialogue among heritage professionals worldwide - between Europe and Asia, Africa, and South America, as well as within those regions. As a connecting link between UNESCO, museums, and communities in countries of origin, the Chair contributes to the broader effort to decolonize museums. This involves a critical rethinking of Eurocentric perspectives and colonial structures, with the aim of making exhibitions and collections more inclusive - in the global North and the global South.

The discussion around the return and restitution of museum collections from the colonial era has gained momentum in recent years. More and more European countries are developing policies in this area and are returning heritage to the communities that created it. The Chair does not focus solely on physical objects, but also on intangible heritage – such as songs and Indigenous knowledge – that has been altered by colonial presence.



A UNESCO Chair is a university-based programme that promotes international inter-university cooperation and networking. It advances research, training, and programme development in higher education. It is a formal partnership between UNESCO and a research institution, where that institution commits to working on a specific area of expertise that aligns with UNESCO's goals.
